- Parents: How have test scores changed at schools in my community since the Covid-19 pandemic?

Education data in the wild


- Data are generally at most two of:
 - (very) useful
 - (very) easy to get
 - (even the slightest bit) clean
- Federally collected (ED, Census, etc.) data are in the sweet spot
 - Pretty useful, pretty easy to get, and pretty clean
 - Can't do large scale longitudinal work
 - There are still LOTS of great research questions to ask from them
 - The only census-level data about (public) education in the US

The Feds collect A. LOT. OF. DATA


But people have to work a bit to get the answers.

- Look for the data you need
 - Start with knowing what data even exist
- Find out you need four datasets from two websites formatted three different ways
- Combine data sets and make it harmonized across years

- Contains everything the federal government knows about every school, district, and college
- Launched in 2018 and updated quarterly, now with 120+ datasets harmonized across sources and over time
- Remains available even when the federal government shuts down

People use it a lot and it accommodates different audience needs.

- 2,000+ monthly users and 10,000+ monthly requests
- Finding out about our users
 - Researchers: Stata and R packages for more technical users (researchers)
 - Advocates, journalists, funders: Data Explorer for less technical users
- All powered by an Application Programming Interface (API)
 - We update one database and all tools update automatically
 - Empowers users to get just the data they need
 - Allows anyone to develop their own app or data tool using the Portal

So what's it like to use the Education Data Portal?

- Types of questions to ask with the Portal
 - What are the demographics of public colleges in Washington?
 - How many Black college graduates in Maryland received degrees in education?
 - How many teachers are there in DC, Virginia, and Maryland public schools?
 - Where should I go to recruit underrepresented minority women in computer science?



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

College Demographics - Washington



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



US schools have become more racially and ethnically diverse over the past few decades, but these changes have played out differently across the country. Understanding a school's demographics can inform conversations around school segregation, redistricting, funding, and equity.


Search for your PK-12 school (prekindergarten through 12th grade) to see how student enrollment by race or ethnicity has changed.

Even with the Portal, there are still some barriers for users, especially non-research users

- You still must
 - Make meaning out of Excel data to understand trends or comparisons
 - Visualize the data yourself if numbers don't immediately communicate what you need
 - Put in some work to pair educational and economic opportunity data with the system conditions that contribute to these outcomes

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The E-W Framework Data Tool solves THOSE problems.

- Based on Gates/Mathematica <u>Education to Workforce Indicator Framework</u>
- An accessible, easily digestible resource to see data on these metrics, all using available federal data
- Allows users to explore data on both outcomes and system conditions at the state county and census tract level, offering a more complete picture of the conditions that help or hinder students' success in their journeys from early education through the workforce in their specific communities.
- Provides users and stakeholders with deidentified data that is shareable, enabling collaboration between community-based organizations and the communities they serve.






