This Mass. college cracks \$100,000 a year — and others are close behind

New England has some of the most prestigious universities in the country. Not surprisingly, <u>it also has some of the</u> <u>most expensive</u>, with Wellesley College recently announcing that overall annual costs for undergraduates will surpass \$100,000 in September.


A staggering sum, but other private schools are close behind. At nearly a dozen universities in the region, including Harvard University, Boston College, Tufts University, and Brandeis University, <u>the total annual cost of</u> <u>attendance will be well above</u> <u>\$90,000</u> next year.

Some colleges cost more than \$100,000 a year to attend. But do they, really?

At universities, the academic year ends with a familiar routine: Professors grade final exams. Students pack up their dorms. Universities announce tuition for the next year, almost inevitably higher than the year before.

Those never-ending increases mean that many Americans believe a four-year college degree is so exorbitantly expensive they cannot afford it, which — <u>some research</u> <u>indicates</u> — deters students from pursuing higher education.

Inflation-adjusted net prices at public flagship/research intensive colleges and universities, by family income





Figure 4: Including tuition, books, fees, meals, housing, and related costs, how much do you think the average student who lives on campus pays per year to attend a public university or college (a "four-year" college)?
